2. Notes of November meeting and matters arising	
 Notes from November were approved as accurate. 	
 BP reported that the previous DfE lead for attendance has been reassigned and he is 	
waiting for a meeting date from her successor. ADCS is lobbying for additional resources	
to be able to implement the statutory requirements in the attendance guidance.	
• SESLIP Education (EHE / CME) Dashboard. Alterations to the medical needs data fields	
have been made. However there is both interest in changes to data systems (away from	со
Capita 1) and in the requests from DfE (WONDE and pilot EHE / CME data). CO will invite	00

3. Children with medical needs, challenges and strategies	
From the round-up:	
• Recognition that tuition, the most common approach, is a stop-gap and less ideal than a	
young person returning to school.	
• Continuing upward pressure on numbers, with the rate of referrals increasing post-	
lockdowns.	
Intervention of LG Ombudsman also adds further to the pressure, with a small but vocal	
minority of parents wishing to access LA tuition as their child's on-going education	
provision instead of school.	
For some of these cases LAs have followed an attendance enforcement route. This	
requires persistence and resource, but has resulted in children returning to school and	
their education progressing as a result.	
Most are not accepting generic GP letter alone. Should be accompanied by	
recommendations for a care plan and/or referral to CAMHs.	
Some LAs have raised issue of wording of medical referrals with medical colleagues	
(GPs, community paediatricians and CAMHs). This has been resulting in useful dialogue	
about approach and move away from broad-brush statements.	
 One or two LAs stipulate sufficient medical referral requires detailed assessment and recommended care plan or will not be accepted. 	
 Majority of LAs have purchase some AV1 education robots. Although there are some 	
challenges with implementing, largely viewed as an improved solution and both focuses	
home school on its responsibility for the pupil's education and improves likelihood of	
reintegration due to access to continuity of learning. Making a case for funding for	
purchase / maintenance is a challenge. Jon from Hants has a presentation about AV1	JW / CO

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 Key points (to be summarised & shared with AD Education Network): Decision-making panels have many positives for managing referrals and reviewing evidence provided. BHCC shared its arrangement that has evolved to include CAMHS rep as well as community paediatrician. Medical referrals: advice to GPs, CAMHs and paediatricians about preferred wording:	СО
4. Attendance guidance implementation	00
 Implementation challenges for September: All LAs report that the new guidance extends the responsibilities of the LA; most specifically to providing monitoring visits with independent schools. 	
 Many have lost significant income streams since their attendance service that previously was bought-in by schools / MATs is not to be provided. Many are hitting barriers and reluctance to engage with prevention and support 	
strategies for vulnerable learners' attendance from other children's services teams. As a result most are negative about education supervision orders and see them being little used.	
 Another major barrier to the enforcement arm of the guidance is the considerable court backlog. Hearings are many months away if an LA serves papers for orders such as parenting, supervision or attendance. 	
Action	
 These challenges to be summarised and reported to the AD Education Network. In particular to support lobbying for funding to deliver the guidance's requirements and about strategies to establish multi-agency partnership in supporting better attendance. 	CO / BP / MS
5. Other challenges and burning issues Some discussion of unregistered AP.	
• All LAs offer some level of QA of providers (via checklist largely) and these tend to be either listed on LA website or list available to schools, if they are considering	
commissioning places. Also checklists for schools to use to inform their commissioning.	
 Agreement that there is a safeguarding risk in current arrangements. Preference that 	
Ofsted be tasked to register and regulate 'unregistered' provision.	
• Experience suggesting that AP is receiving an increased profile in SEND area inspections.
