Introduction







The West Sussex steering group has a large participation rate with members from the ICB, Social Care, Commissioning, Early Help, Parent Carer Forum, Participation Team, Specialist Advisory Teaching Team, SENDIAS and the local offer.

Outcomes

- To embed the principles of the co-production into everything that we do as a local area.
- To ensure that co-production is considered for all aspects of our improvement work and impact is measured, and that the Steering Group has strategic oversight of this area of work.
- To ensure there are opportunities for children and young people to engage in active coproduction both at an individual and wider level and to participate in surveys, communications and working groups.
- To ensure there are parent carers to engage in active coproduction both at an individual and wider level and to participate in surveys, communications and working groups.

Activity







Key Outputs from the Steering Group

- Charter Development: The final version of the Co-production Charter has been produced, going through six iterations. The charter was co-designed by WSPCF, Young Voices, and the multi-agency group, and a first version has been produced by graphics. Early Help and Social Care will use this charter in training and guidance to embed co-production practices across the council's work. - Collecting Evidence on Effective Co-production Practices: The group is actively gathering evidence across CYPL
 (Children, Young People, and Learning), from professionals and parents to identify and share effective co-production practices. This is done by looking at individual, operational, and strategic levels of co-production.

CHILDREN FIRST CO-PRODUCTION CHARTER FOR WORKING WITH PARENTS, CARERS AND CHILDREN

Commitment to building collaborative meaningful partnerships; starting with what really matters.





WHAT IS CO-PRODUCTION?

Co-producing with parents and children involves creating collaborative partnerships where their insights and experiences shape decision-making for individuals, services and policies. For example:

Individual level: school staff meet with parents, carers and children before writing an individual support plan, and then the plan is written coproductively.

Operational level: parents, carers, children and young people work together to create a school behaviour policy.

Strategic: parents, carers, children and professionals work together to create a long-term plan, using data and case studies to develop a support service for young carers.

"At West Sussex County Council we believe embracing co-production can lead to effective, sustainable, and responsive services.

This is our commitment for working together. We believe we must create inclusive environments that value the contributions of all those involved, ultimately resulting in better outcomes for individuals and communities."

HOW TO CO-PRODUCE

- Listen to each other and demonstrate that we have taken on board what each other has communicated.
- Communicate in an easy-to-understand way.
- · Support individuals to take part, by making reasonable adjustments.
- · Always be open, honest, and realistic.
- Involve individuals in decisions, so they are there as part of the decisionmaking processes. If decisions are made without individuals explain why.
- · If you gather views act upon them.
- · Treat individuals with respect and dignity.
- · Give individuals the tools they need to feel safe to enable them to share experiences.
- Provide individuals with information, which is accurate, timely, accessible, and consistent.
- Involve individuals at the earliest opportunity. Set out clear guidelines and any limitations of projects.

KEY ASPECTS OF CO-PRODUCTION

- Collaboration: individuals actively participate in decision making about themselves / those they care
 for, including the design, delivery, and evaluation of services, rather than being presented information
- 2. Learning: participants learn from each other, leading to skills, and trust within the community.
- Empowerment: co-production empowers groups by giving them a voice in decisionmaking processes, rebalancing power dynamics between all involved.
- 4. Innovation: diverse perspectives can lead to creative solutions.
- Equal Footing: address historical power imbalances, fostering mutual respect, ensuring that all individuals have an equal say and influence in decision-making processes.







Why we created the Panel



- We created Together for Change because we needed a space where coproduction could actually happen—not just be referenced. A space where professionals and parent carers could meet as equals, share ideas, challenge respectfully, and shape services together.
- Before this panel, feedback was often gathered in silos, after the fact, or not at all. Now, we have a doing space—where ideas are brought earlier, shaped live, and improved collaboratively.
- Who attends? Parent carers and a mix of professionals (rotational basis) including the DSCO, DCO, Health Rep, SEND and Inclusion Team Rep, Early Help Rep, Local Offer Officer.





- We are currently trialling a Pan Sussex 'Together for Change' Panel
